Information MCA Hall Hire, Hall Use Fees, Membership and Benefits

Guideline to MCA (Manawatu Chinese Association) Membership, Activity Fees and Rental Costs as at 1 June 2024- 31 May 2025. The fees are reviewed twice a year by the committee.

Membership Fees:

Individual	\$20
Family	\$40
Senior Over 65 years old	Free/Voluntary Donation
Friends of MCA	\$75

What does Membership give you?

- a) Membership discount from businesses who support MCA.
- b) Useful information, notices of forthcoming events and newsletter
- c) Events provided by MCA and Services provided by Integration Project
- d) Discount to attend PNCS (Palmerston North Chinese School) who support MCA

Additional Annual Fee for Regular Activity (for both members and friends of MCA)

\$45/year for one session per week activity

\$90/year for two sessions per week activities

\$130/year for three sessions per week activities

- a) Includes leisure activities like badminton/table tennis/tai chi/dancing/mah-jong/pickleball
- b) Excludes private groups who hire the use of the hall
- c) The year is from 1 June to 31 May or half year fee for a start from late December
- d) Fees paid via internet banking only, with Membership Fee on Membership form
- e) Members/Friends of MCA not paying activity fee; casual rate \$3 per session
- f) General Public may join in an approved activity but need to pay casual rate \$5 per session.
- g) Team leader to keep register of attendees

Note – Fees are to cover the cost of expenses e.g. cost of heating, lighting, security and repair and maintenance of the building and property.

Hall Hire:

The MCA hall is used by the wider community, and regular activities are booked in throughout the week. We are currently investigating some ways to streamline our bookings and see when there are empty time slots. Keep an eye out for this.

We currently have Lily running our opening hours on Sundays, with the backing of a supporting team of volunteers. If you have some time to spare, we are always on the lookout for more helping hands.

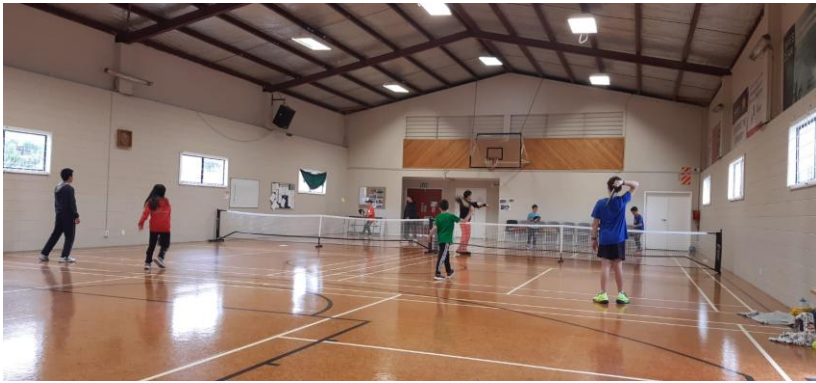
Our team can also accept your preloved items you wish to donate. All the profits will go to MCA hall maintenance and services to the community.

Constitution Changes

A MCA subcommittee led by Tony Thackery has been working through the required changes to our current constitution to comply with the new law. As an incorporated society, we must have this done by April 2026 to continue operating.



But what does it all mean?

Although our current constitution falls under the laws of the Incorporated Societies Act 1908, it has been updated several times to reflect the changes times, but still within the legal requirements of a 1908 law. This has now been superseded by the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 which aims to strengthen governance functions by aligning director duties more closely with those in the Companies Act. This includes new officers' duties and dispute resolution processes.

Nothing much changes under the new law, from what we are currently doing, other than formalising and ensuring clear and transparent processes are being followed. A key focus is around accurate record keeping, and we will be looking at ways to streamline keeping all membership details upto date and secured.

When the new constitution is finalised, the MCA membership will be consulted for comments, before being submitted for reregistration.

After we have reregistered, all new memberships will fall under the new constitution. Existing membership will be retained under the current constitution until they renew.

Club and Activity night



Our first MCA club and activities night will commence at the MCA hall Fri 2nd May from 7-10 pm.

This will be an intergenerational social event for families and friends and a chance to meet new people and renew old connections whilst having fun with activities such as mahjong ,board games Karaoke ,table tennis, badminton and pickleball.

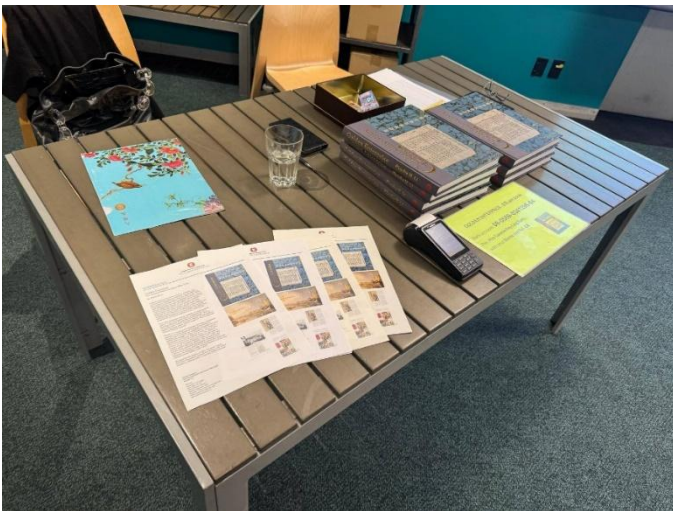

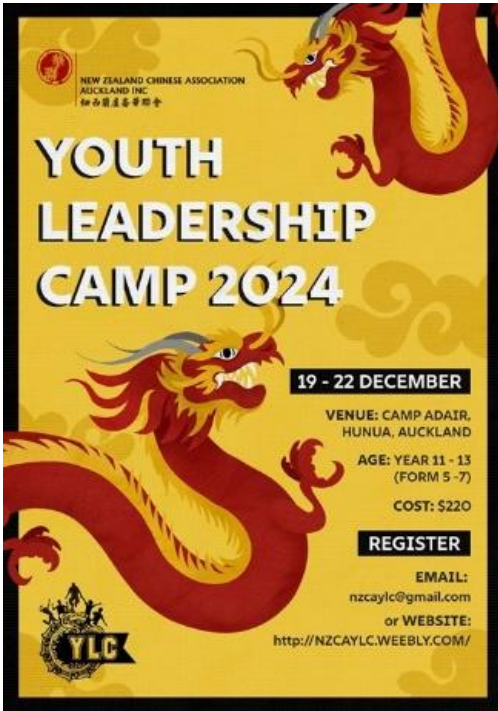
She explained her eagerness to get around the local Chinese community to hear stories to contribute to her research work in NZ Chinese migration patterns.

Youth Leadership Camp



The New Zealand Chinese Association, Youth Leadership Camp (YLC), is an initiative to bring together our future leaders, through a comprehensive leadership, cultural and team building experience for Chinese students across the community, where unforgettable memories are made and long-lasting friendships evolve.

2024 marks the seventh NZCA Youth Leadership Camp.

The Manawatu branch sponsored two young members to attend the camp over the period 19 Dec to 22 Dec 2024.

I discovered this camp only a month before and had no idea what this camp is about. Got off my flight at 8am and waited for around 6 hrs until picked up. I met the first few delegates at the mall during the wait. Everyone was chill and gave me good feelings for the camp. Upon entering the grounds of Camp Adair and being one of the first delegates, I was greeted by several facilitators - all were very welcoming. Like most people, I was surprised to find out later on how most of the camp is white washed.

YLC provided me with unforgettable memories and allowed me to get time off screen which is very nice. I thought I would be more nervous but turns out I wasn't. The food were all really good that I even went for fourth. I actually had expected more muddy/water activities since in the equipment list it said extra clothes for muddy activities but turns out the Burma trail was the only one. To be honest, the Burma trail was scarier than the ropes. When the lead said to duck I was ducking for my life. Luckily I only smacked into three trees.

This camp allowed me to step out my comfort zone and realize my capabilities. Never knew I would pop those dance moves at the diamond dance thing. Highlight of the camp have to be the rope course and surprised even myself by doing those 42 blind folded push ups on the hi-beam. Mentioning Adam (one of my two amazing leaders) for also doing 21 push ups on the beam. Shoutout to all my fellow teammates in my group (Hong Baos) for being so supportive and amazing. Even though we came second for the presentations but the experience from it is the part that really values - Up the Woks!

Overall the camp was a very fulfilling experience. Met great people and made wonderful friends. I'm gonna end it here because I could go on and talk about every detail but that will take forever.

In special memory of Jenny Chu - Alex Chu

Today, we are here to celebrate Jenny's life: to remember what Jenny meant for each one of us individually.

I have the following examples of what Jenny's life meant to me:

1. Poh Yum her Chinese name 曾寶艷

Poh (寶) means previous, Yum (艷) means beautiful and gorgeous. When we first met in 1965, in Palmerston North, I did not know her Chinese name. Jenny did not know how to write Chinese. I only found out what her Chinese names were when I went to Malacca, her home town in Malaysia, to meet her parents to ask for her hand in marriage.

I was told that before she was one year old the fortune-teller at the temple told her mother, in order to balance her life's energy her name has to be changed from Yum (艷) beautiful and gorgeous to Yum (焱) with 3 fires:

When I found out her name Yum has 3 fires, I thought to myself: Oh dear, am I getting a beautiful but hot-tempered wife? And then her Auntie told me the fortune teller removed one of the top fires to cool her down a little.

Luckily for me, her TWO fires turned out to have nothing to do with hot temper but represented **WARMTH** and **BRIGHTNESS**. Her WARMTH had touched her friends' life, and BRIGHTNESS, like a **BEACON**, a lighthouse, helping them to find the right way. This has been referred to in almost all the condolence messages I received.

2. What does Jenny mean to me in my life?

I met Jenny when she was studying at PN Girl's High School in 1965, and she was 16 years old. I was called "a cradle-snatcher". She was my first and only girlfriend: and I was her first and only boyfriend. For almost 60 years we were together, through thick and thin. She was my light, my beacon, and my soul-mate. She shared the honours I received while working at Massey University. Behind every great man there is greater woman

3. Jenny's respect for other religions

When I went to Malacca to ask her father for her hand in marriage, Jenny's family are Buddhist; like Carrol and Doreen sitting here. I am a Christian. So, I asked Jenny whether we can get married in a Christian church?

"I have no problem following the Christian faith", because I believe in "**Let Thy Will be Done**".

- The Buddhists believe in "**KarMa**"
- The Muslims believe in "**InshaAllah**"
- Jenny, a strong Christian, believed "**Let God's Will be Done**".

4. What happened in ICU on Sunday night (16th June 2024) ?

Jenny was transported to hospital by St. John ambulance around 3.30 am on Sunday; she was barely conscious and could not talk or move her body. When I left her just after 2.00 pm there was hardly any improvement. I went back to ICU at 7.00 pm and there she was, moving her legs vigorously and her hands were tearing at her neck brace.

She was tearing at the tapes that the nurse used to tie the leather glove to cover her finger, to stop her using her fingers to untie the tapes. Now, if she can coordinate her **EYES** and **HANDS** to pull off the tapes one by one, her brain must be working, and Halleluiah, I thought she must be improving. The doctor in charge did say these are signs of improvement, but unless they persist it is too early to draw any conclusions. I left her at 8.30 pm, she was still tearing at the gloves. I went back the next morning Jenny has deteriorated and was

on her last minutes. My question to myself was: if she can coordinate her eyes with her fingers why was she tearing at the equipment that are keeping her alive? All that time she did not look at me, nor squeezed my hand. but only trying to remove the equipment that was protecting her .

May be last night was a flick of the candle before it went out, maybe it was not; maybe Jenny was involved

I have a simple explanation, may be a childish, but I personally believe it is possible. I prayed very hard, like many relatives and friends all over the world; we all prayed to God to let Jenny recover. God is great, He has answered our prayers, and He was going to let Jenny live. **BUT JENNY DISAGREED**

She was fighting to tear down the equipment that was protecting her. She did not want to wake up as a vegetable and she wants to free me from looking after a vegetable. She pulled off a final **KAMIKAZE**. God did answer our prayers, but Jenny, who loves a bargain, had negotiated a WIN/WIN situation for both of us. I like to believe that.

I thank you for coming to share this cerebation of Jenny's Life with the family. For my Jenny was my soul-mate and an Angel from Heaven, sent by Almighty God to help me in my career; and to share her warmth and her beacon with all of you here and beyond. She was a Good Samaritan from God with a Christian attitude of helping people, and more importantly with love and respect to people from different religions.

Jenny would say:
Regardless of what religion we are from, we are all God's Children
